Tribute to Lynda Cantor MBE

Our founder and honorary president Lynda Cantor MBE sadly passed away on Thursday 21 August 2025. We are all deeply saddened by this news.



Lynda founded the charity 50 years ago and continued to serve as a Trustee until recently. She was the driving force behind the charity's development from a small community group to the respected national organisation it is today.

Lynda made a huge impact for thousands of people living with inherited sight loss throughout the charity's history.

Her unwavering commitment, determination and vision were fuelled by the impact of retinitis pigmentosa on her own life.

When Lynda formed The British Retinitis Pigmentosa Society (BRPS) in 1975, little could she imagine the organisation that Retina UK has become.

Since the first fundraising garden party in 1975 (which made a profit of £187) Retina UK has invested more than £18 million into ground-breaking research and huge advances have been made into unlocking the causes of inherited sight loss and developing potential treatments.

Lynda was recognised for her work with the award of an MBE in 1994. She was also involved in the formation of Retina International.

Lynda was the lifeblood of our charity for 50 years and a true force of nature. She was a beacon of hope for the community and will always remain a source of inspiration for all those who were fortunate enough to meet her.

She will be sadly missed by the trustees, staff, volunteers and all those involved with Retina UK over the years. Our thoughts are with her family at this sad time.

Kathy Evans, Chair of Trustee Board, Retina UK

After graduating in law from the University of Liverpool, Kathy Evans secured a training contract with KPMG and qualified as a chartered accountant. She held finance roles with the Arts Council of Great Britain and the TSB Group before moving into the charitable sector. She managed the finances for a number of charities before joining the Royal College of Ophthalmologists (RCOphth) as its Accountant.

She was appointed Chief Executive of the College in 2004 and served until her retirement in 2023. Working with colleagues, College Officers and members, she was responsible for the College's day-to-day management. During her tenure the organisation grew, became more professional, more outward looking and more complex.

She is a member of the Links Network Advisory Committee, run by the International Centre for Eye Health.

In retirement she passed the Diploma in Medical History organised by the Worshipful Society of Apothecaries.

Kathy joined Retina UK as Chair of Trustees in September 2024. She has long admired the work of the charity and has enjoyed meeting many of the people connected with it.



Tina Garvey Chief Executive, Retina UK

Tina Garvey is Chief Executive at Retina UK. Since joining the charity, in August 2015, the organisation has significantly grown its information and support services, and work toward funding medical research to find effective treatments for inherited progressive sight loss conditions.

Tina plays an active role within the vision sector, such as becoming a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Spectacle Makers. She leads a team committed to making sure that our community is being heard and getting the very best information and services, and that the charity has the greatest possible impact.

Tina has more than 20 years' experience in the charity and public sector. She has a BSc in Science and Social Sciences, a postgraduate diploma in Marketing, an MSc in Leadership and Management in Public Services and a Masters in Law. She was awarded a Honorary Fellowship from the University of Hertfordshire in 2024.



Paula McGrath Deputy Chief Executive, Retina UK

Paula McGrath is Deputy Chief Executive at Retina UK.

She joined the health charity sector in 2006, following an early career as a journalist. She led the communications teams at the PSP Association, Education for Health and Motor Neurone Disease Association before joining Retina UK in 2018.

Paula is passionate about making an impact for families affected by rare conditions. She uses audience insight to ensure organisational development is designed to meet the needs and aspirations of the communities being served. In 2019, Paula introduced the first Retina UK Sight Loss Survey and in response to the findings has overseen the creation of new resources including Unlock Genetics and Discover Wellbeing and the development of our offering for professionals.

Paula represents Retina UK at numerous external meetings and groups including the All Party Parliamentary Group on Eye Health and the Vision Partnership.

Paula holds the Coaching Skills Certificate with the Association of Executive Coaches.



Robert Henderson, Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon, Great Ormond Street Hospital and Moorfields Eye Hospital

Robert Henderson is a Consultant Paediatric Ophthalmologist and Adult & Paediatric Vitreoretinal Surgeon at Great Ormond Street Hospital and Moorfields Eye Hospital, and an Honorary Associate Professor at the UCL-GOSH Institute of Child Health. He specialises in the surgical and genetic management of paediatric retinal diseases.

Robert leads the inherited retinal dystrophy clinic at Great Ormond Street Hospital and has established an innovative dual sensory clinic serving families affected by combined visual and hearing impairments. He directs the Voretigene ocular gene therapy programme at Great Ormond Street Hospital and serves as the North Thames Specialty Lead for Ophthalmic Genomics.

Mr Henderson serves as principal surgeon for ongoing gene therapy trials addressing USH1B (AAVantgarde) and RPGR-related X-linked retinitis pigmentosa (BEACON Therapeutics). He is also actively involved in pioneering approaches for subretinal photoreceptor stem cell delivery.

His clinical and research interests are dedicated to developing and delivering innovative therapies for rare inherited retinal diseases.



Michael Crossland, Senior Research Fellow, University College London (UCL) Institute of Ophthalmology

Michael Crossland is a principal optometrist at Moorfields Eye Hospital and a senior research fellow at University College London. He has worked in the NHS low vision clinic at Moorfields for over 25 years, in which time he has met thousands of children, adolescents and adults. He researches mental health and wellbeing in people with vision impairment, with a particular focus on young people with inherited retinal disease. He is also interested in the use of new technology by people with low vision.



Rachel Canavan, PhD student, University College London (UCL) Institute of Ophthalmology

Rachel Canavan is a PhD student at the UCL Institute of Ophthalmology, funded by Moorfields Eye Charity. She has a background in psychology and child mental health. Her research is focused on the mental health and wellbeing of children and young people with vision impairment. The goal of her PhD research is to identify risk and resilience factors to inform the recommendation of the development of a package of supportive interventions for young people, designed in collaboration with individuals who have lived experience.



Stevie Johnson, Clinical Lead for RNIB's Eye Care Support Team

Stevie Johnson is the Clinical Lead for RNIB's Eye Care Support Team and leads on Eye Care Liaison Officer (ECLO) training and ensuring services are consistent and professional through the development and maintenance of Quality Standards and resources.

Simon Labbett, Chair, Rehabilitation Workers Professional Network

Simon Labbett has been active in the sight loss sector since 1988, beginning his career with the Royal National Institute of Blind People as a Braille music transcriber, before becoming interested in music and art for vision impaired people.

Initially qualifying as a Vision Rehabilitation Specialist in 2005, he completed a BSc in Complex Needs Rehabilitation Work (visual impairment) at Birmingham City University in 2018.

In 2013 Simon played a pivotal role in establishing and chairing the first professional body in the UK for Vision Rehabilitation Specialists. The Rehabilitation Workers Professional Network (RWPN) is now 12 years old and has over 500 practitioners and students as members. In 2022 he guided RWPN's work in gaining accredited register status for its professional register with the Professional Standards Authority.

Simon works full time as a Vision Rehabilitation Specialist in the Sensory Needs team within the City of Bradford's social services. In 2023 he was visiting lecturer at Glasgow Caledonian University delivering modules on the Low Vision Rehabilitation postgraduate diploma.

In 2025 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by Birmingham City University for his work in the sector and in developing a professional body for Vision Rehabilitation Specialists.



Bhavini Makwana, Policy and Campaigns Manager for Thomas Pocklington Trust and Chair of BAME Vision

Bhavini Makwana works as a Policy and Campaigns Manager for Thomas Pocklington Trust and is the Chair of BAME Vision, which she founded in 2020. She is also the London and South East Group Facilitator and an Ambassador, for Retina UK.

Bhavini was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa when she was 17 and received vital rehabilitation support 12 years after her diagnosis, which she describes as 'life changing'. She now ensures that everyone is aware of rehabilitation support and how to access it. She is a mother, wife, and a proud owner to her beautiful and full of character Guide Dog Colin.

Bhavini aims to empower those with vision impairment by sharing resources (including lived experience stories) and signposting to information. She aims to break down barriers and stigma around sight loss and eye health in ethnic minority communities. She champions and advocates for an accessible, inclusive, and equitable society for blind and partially sighted people to live and thrive in.

Davinder Kullar is a first generation Indian born in the UK. He was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa as a young teenager and said that "learning to adapt to each change experienced was the key to success".

Part of his toolkit has been technology. Combining this with his ability to communicate complex things in simple ways, has allowed him to have a career in teaching, coaching and mentoring others with low or no vision.

He has worked in the sector for over 10 years and has recently set up his own business and consultancy, continuing to teach, coach and mentor people. He believes people can reach their potential with the right mix of attitude, skills acquisition and removing barriers.
